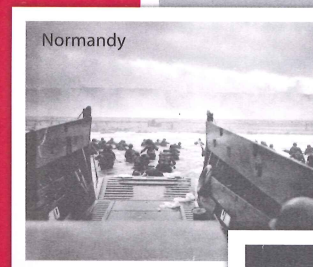

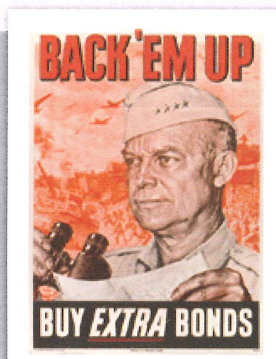

Introducing the World War II Study Abroad Scholarship Fund in History to support the new academic program:

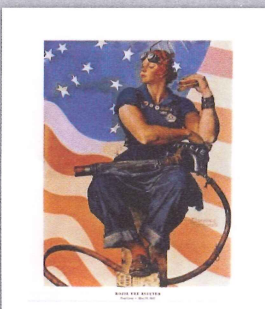
**The United States, Europe, and the
Second World War: Intersections
in 20th Century History**

This academic/study abroad program will reveal to our next generation of leaders how the legacies of the Second World War in American and World History shape contemporary national security issues.

As a turning point in the 20th century, World War II had far-reaching repercussions that echo into the 21st century. The war marked the rise of the United States to superpower status and the waning of European colonial empires. Its conduct, consequences, and legacies shaped Cold War conflicts in Africa, the Middle East, Latin America, and Asia, and incited wars of national liberation and decolonization. The war experience accelerated the spread of American-style capitalism, development of an integrated Europe, and attempts to mediate conflicts through international institutions. It stimulated economic growth in the U.S. and abroad and the start of social movements associated with labor, gender, and race. Contested memories of the war in the U.S., Europe, and elsewhere continue to evolve.



In this program, 20 Ohio State students from diverse disciplines and backgrounds will study World War II, with a particular focus on the United States and Europe, under four OSU professors. The students will take a challenging group of history and culture courses in the Spring semester, meeting frequently in small-class settings to exchange ideas, to discuss their research, and to prepare for the second portion of the program—a three-week tour of World War II sites, memorials, and museums in Europe (London, Normandy, Belgium, Paris, and Berlin). This powerful interdisciplinary program, emblematic of Ohio State's motto, "education for citizenship," will furnish the students a strong foundation for their future roles as leaders in government, business, academia, and other professions.



Inaugural Faculty for the Program



Professor **Bill Childs** (History) will be the Program Director and primary Resident Director and will teach the modern U.S. history (1921-1963) course.
Expertise: Modern U.S., History of Capitalism, Twentieth Century World.



Associate Professor **Jennifer Willging** (French) will be the Assistant Program Director and Assistant Resident Director and will teach a French-U.S. comparative culture course.
Expertise: 20th- and 21st-century French literature and culture, with particular interests in Second World War France, postwar narrative, and contemporary French-American cultural relations.



Associate Professor and the General Raymond Mason, Jr. Chair in Military History **Pete Mansoor** (History, Mershon Center) will teach the World War II course for the program.
Expertise: History of War, American Military History, Counter-Insurgency.



Associate Professor **Alan Beyerchen** (History) will direct the research course for the program.
Expertise: Modern Europe, Modern Germany, the Holocaust, and World War I and World War II.
